Dr. Carolyn Cumpsty Fowler, a nurse epidemiologist and core faculty member of the Center for Injury Research and Policy, has conducted research into traumatic brain injury in children; child pedestrian injury; psycho-social outcomes from bicycle-related head injury in children; recreational injury; penetrating eye injury; and outcomes from maxillo-facial injury. Currently she is engaged in design and evaluation of community efforts to reduce sleep environment related death in infants.

Her main interest, however, is public health workforce development and translation of theory into practice. Specifically, this involves application of theory in the design, implementation, and evaluation of public health programs at the local level, as well as the development of community capacity to address injury. Dr. Fowler is a core faculty of the Mid Atlantic Public Health Training Center (at JHBSPH), and is involved in local, national and international training initiatives, including the National Injury and Violence Training Initiative; she also serves as Professional Development Chair for STIPDA (the State and Territorial Injury Prevention Directors Association).

Dr. Fowler, who serves as Faculty Director for the Johns Hopkins Summer Institute "Principles and Practice of Injury Prevention", is an active injury prevention practitioner and licensed Child Passenger Safety Technician and directs an injury prevention program in a local health department. She serves on the National Advisory Committee for Child Death Review, the Maryland Injury Prevention Partnership Advisory Board, and chairs the Baltimore County Child Death Review Team. Dr. Fowler, former chairperson of the Advisory Committee for Injury Prevention and Control at CDC, now serves as Chair of the Board of Scientific Counselors for the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control at CDC.

Scott Krugman, MD, MS, FAAP

Scott Krugman, MD, MS is Chairman, Department of Pediatrics at Franklin Square Hospital Center. Dr. Krugman graduated from Dartmouth Medical School and completed his residency at Johns Hopkins Children's Center. After residency he became a member of the pediatric faculty at Franklin Square Hospital Center and Assistant Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. In 2002, he became chairman of pediatrics at Franklin Square. Dr. Krugman completed a masters degree in epidemiology in 2005, and in 2006 was appointed as Clinical Assistant Professor of Epidemiology and Preventive Medicine at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. He founded Franklin Square's Child Protection Team in 2000 with the aid of a VOCA grant which evaluates over 250 children at the hospital each year. In 2002 a Maryland Children's Trust Fund grant helped start the "Prevention is the best medicine" program to work on child abuse prevention efforts in eastern Baltimore County. Dr. Krugman is also co-chair of the Baltimore County Child Fatality Review Team, the Baltimore County Child Protection Review Panel, the State Council on Child Abuse and Neglect, the board of The Family Tree, and is Secretary/Treasurer of the Maryland Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Stephanie Regenold is a Senior Advisor to the Babies Born Healthy Initiative at the Baltimore City Health Department. Dr. Regenold received her medical degree from McGill University. She completed her Family Medicine residency through the University of Maryland and Franklin Square Hospital. She received her Masters in Public Health from the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, and completed her residency in Public Health & Preventive Medicine through the Maryland Department of Health & Mental Hygiene and St. Mary's Hospital Medical School in London. She has worked as a health care provider in Baltimore City's Sexually Transmitted Diseases Clinics, at the Homewood Campus of Johns Hopkins University, and as a family physician in Portland, Oregon. In 2004 she became the Coordinator for Baltimore City Health Department's Infant Safe Sleep Initiative, and continues to work on issues related to infant safe sleep. She is also a consultant for First Candle, a national non-profit that promotes safe pregnancies and the survival of babies through the first years of life. Dr. Regenold is a member of Baltimore City's Fetal & Infant Mortality Review and Child Fatality Review Teams.
